

To introduce this topic, informally help your child identify colors. For example, as you're working in the kitchen, you might say, "I'm preparing something green for lunch. What do you think we'll eat?" Or tomorrow morning, ask, "Do you want to wear the shirt that's red or the shirt that's blue?" Especially enjoy discovering with your child the special colors that pop up in spring.

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## Introducing Treehouse Time!

BOZ Treehouse Time! encourages young children to discover God's world through play-based, faith-focused activities. The interactive learning experiences will help children know and love God.

Because many younger children are not enrolled in a formal program for learning, MOPPETS is their "school." Ideas and activities in *Treehouse Time!* are developmentally appropriate for children under the age of 6. This includes the selective use of interactive media to extend children's active engagement as they explore, create, learn and imagine.

Young children gain a great deal of security from routine, so develop a logical pattern that can be used for each session, even if adult leaders rotate.

The lesson elements are designed to be flexible, so feel free to establish a routine that works best for your group.

For example, after children are checked in, you might follow this plan:

- \* After the children have arrived, say "It's Treehouse Time! Come and sit down in front of me on the rug."
- \* Look in the BOZ bag. Use children's responses to extend the conversation about the object or theme. Introduce the memory verse during this opening discussion.
- \* Do the activity rhyme.
- \* Show the video.
- \* Do a craft.
- \* Encourage the children to float back into free play after completing the craft.
- \* Pray and then serve the snack.
- \* Do the activity rhyme.
- \* Read a book.
- \* Say the closing prayer.
- \* End with the BOZ Treehouse Time! rhyme.

# Growing Colors

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### Lesson Overview

## Just for You

Children are surrounded by a rainbow in God's colorful world. Researchers have shown a simple change in sentence structure helps children learn those colors more quickly. For example, saying "grab the balloon that's red" instead of "grab the red balloon" directs attention to the color. This is another way to support learning about God's colorful world, which is the focus of this session.

## Let's Get Ready!

Suggestions and ideas to help get your room, space or table ready.

In advance, cut apart cardboard egg cartons, leaving the tips of the egg cups poking straight up (or you can round them off with a scissors). Some cartons can be notched so the "petals" will open like tulips. Use a sharpened pencil to poke two holes in the center of each egg cup.

Use a black marker to draw a large circle for each child on a piece of newspaper. Write each child's name inside a circle, and set the newspaper aside.

Tape plastic garbage bags to the table as a protective covering. Pour several colors of washable tempera paint into separate dishes.

Engage children in this activity as they enter. This will allow the paint to dry so children can complete the craft before the session ends.

Invite children to paint the inside and outside of several egg cups. As children paint, talk about the colors, encouraging them to choose different colors for the inside and outside of the "flowers." If desired, lay the wet cups in a box lid and sprinkle on glitter. Then lay the cups to dry in the labeled newspaper circles.





## BOZ Bag

Use a color printer to reproduce the BOZ bag image available online at www.BozTheBear.com/moppets. Attach the image to a pillowcase or cloth bag.

Put one large crayon of each of the following colors in the bag: red, orange, yellow, green, blue and purple. As children take out and identify each color, lay the crayons in order (red, orange, yellow, green, blue, purple) to create a mini rainbow. When all six crayons have been laid out, ask children to guess what you've made.

Transition into this verse:


We talk about our big green earth
But that's not really true (shake head "no")
There's orange, yellow, purple, red
And God also made blue

The sky above has puffy clouds (point up)
So white up in the sky
And trunks of trees that are so brown (lean down, then stretch up with arms)
When they grow very high

### **Activities**

#### Option 1: Four Square Cities (Creative Play)

Use masking tape to make a large cross with arms of equal length stretching into a corner of the floor. Choose a variety of small vehicles, small toys and play props that are predominantly yellow, blue, green or red.

On a piece of paper, download or draw simple pictures of a large blue pond to put in the blue sector, trees or grass for the green sector, a beach for the yellow sector and a fire station for the red. Match similarly colored toys within each sector. Encourage children to drive vehicles between the different "cities."

Use leading questions to help children make up stories about the "color cities." For example, you could ask, "What green food do they eat in Green City?" or "Why does the fire engine need to drive to Blue City?"

> If your MOPPETS span a large age range, they will reflect the three basic levels of learning colors: matching (hold up a car that is blue and ask a child to find something else that is blue), identifying (say, "Find a vehicle that is red") and naming (this is the ability to see a color and name it; for example, a child might say, "Here is a car that's blue").

## Activities

#### Option 3: Walk Around the World (Interactive Song)

In advance, collect a piece of paper in each of these colors: red, green, blue, yellow and orange.

Walk in a circle with the children, singing these verses to the tune of "The Farmer in the Dell." Walk without stopping as you sing the first verse. For each of the verses after that, stop walking when you reach the third line, and hold up the paper that represents the color indicated. Children who are wearing that color should jump in place during the last two lines of the verse. Start walking again when you begin a new verse.

### Activities

#### Option 4: Catch a Color (Game)

In advance, cut the bottoms from clean, empty plastic milk jugs or laundry detergent bottles. Use masking or duct tape to cover any sharp plastic rims. Collect four yarn balls: red, yellow, green and blue.

Invite the children to decorate each jug with stickers of only one color: red, yellow, green or blue.

After children have decorated the jugs to use as ball catchers, invite them to toss and catch the yarn ball that matches the sticker color they used.









### Crafts

#### Option 1: Happy Mother's Day

Use the egg-carton sections painted earlier in this session to complete this craft. After the egg cups have dried completely, children can loop a green pipe cleaner through the two holes, allowing a lengthy "stem." Ask each child to make a bouquet of several long-stemmed flowers, which can be tied together with ribbon as a gift for Mother's Day.

For a fancier appearance, insert stems into a clump of Play-Doh or clay stuck in the bottom of a small pot. Stuff the pot with leftover Easter grass, green tissue paper or shredded green construction paper. Tie a bow around the pot.

#### Option 2: Rainy Day Picture

In advance, tint the contents of small glue bottles with blue food coloring.

Play the song "Rain, Rain" (1:41) from BOZ's Treehouse Tunes #1.

Invite children to draw flowers using brightly colored or fluorescent markers on white construction paper. Children can drizzle the tinted "rain" on their spring pictures. Allow the pictures to dry completely.







## Snacks

#### Option 1: Drew's Delicious Dirt

Fill a clear plastic cup halfway with chocolate pudding. Put two chocolate cookies in a plastic zip-close bag. Close the bag tightly.

Invite children to crush the cookies by squeezing the bag or using a rolling pin to create a bag of crumbs. Dump the crumbs onto the top of the pudding. Press in a large gummy worm so half of it is sticking out of the "dirt." Serve with a spoon and napkins.

#### Option 2: Fruit Kabobs

Purchase party picks (cello frill, pinwheel or flag) that are suitable for making miniature kabobs. Also in advance, select three or four different-colored fruits. Firm blueberries, halved grapes, halved strawberries, pie-shaped pieces of kiwi, peach squares, maraschino cherries and papaya squares all work well for this snack.

Serve the fruit on colored paper plates that match the colors of the foods. Children can make party-pick kabobs using various kinds of fruit or just one fruit.

Encourage older children to create a colorful pattern — for example, purple grape, strawberry, kiwi; purple grape, strawberry, kiwi.



What did BOZ see in the sky that was special?








# Closing Prayer
